

OUR MISSION:

The Ventures Scholars Program identifies, recognizes, and supports students from underrepresented backgrounds and helps them pursue math, science and technology-based education and careers.

An Important National Problem:

- **Students of color** continue to be underrepresented in degree attainment. In 2000, they earned 21.8% of all bachelor's degrees awarded, however, they accounted for more than 28% of all undergraduates.
- **Every year underrepresented minorities** enter undergraduate engineering and science curricula; however, they represent less than five percent of the recipients for advanced degrees in engineering and science.
- **Members of underrepresented racial and ethnic groups** make up about 25 percent of the U.S. population. However, their representation among health professionals is only about ten percent.

The Ventures Scholars Program Solution:

The Ventures Scholars Program (VSP) is a national resource that helps increase the number of underrepresented and first-generation college-bound students who pursue math, science and technology education, and, ultimately, careers in related professions.

Starting in high school, students who express an interest in math or science, demonstrate academic excellence, and perform well on national standardized examinations are invited to become Ventures Scholars. Ventures Scholars receive a certificate to recognize their achievement. Their names are provided to their high schools and to local media so that they can be honored at awards ceremonies and given visibility in their communities.

Ventures Scholars are offered a range of free services to help them better connect to enrichment programs, scholarships, internships and other resources. Over 200 college and university members,

The Ventures Scholars Program, a program of Ventures In Education, Inc (VIE)—a 501 (c) 3 non-profit entity—is based on an earlier, more narrowly defined prototype created in 1990, the Minorities In Medicine (MIM) Program. The MIM Program played a significant role in increasing the number of minority college graduates prepared for admission to medical schools.

In 1999, the MIM Program transitioned to the Ventures Scholars Program and its mission was expanded to increase the number of underrepresented students pursuing career pathways, not only in medicine, but in the allied health professions, engineering, science, mathematics, and technology.



including many selective institutions across the country, reach out to Ventures Scholars through mailings, email contacts, and college fairs to further establish communication channels between Ventures Scholars and admissions officers.

After Ventures Scholars transition to college, they are invited to remain part of the Ventures Scholars Program network. Undergraduate Ventures Scholars are invited to utilize education and career planning resources offered by graduate and professional school, and professional association members. The undergraduate Ventures Scholars are also an invaluable source of advice and mentoring for high school Ventures Scholars as they transition from high school to college.

The Ventures Scholars Program provides a variety of communication tools, largely through its Web site, email newsletters, and targeted emails to help Ventures Scholars learn about educational resources, summer jobs and internships, and career opportunities. Networking message boards provide opportunities for new Ventures Scholars to contact and seek guidance from Ventures Scholars now in college or, eventually, in the workforce.

VENTURES SCHOLARS REPRESENT BOTH DIVERSITY AND ACHIEVEMENT

The Ventures Scholars Program collaborates with the College Board and ACT to identify students who meet specific academic requirements and career interests and invites them to join the Program.

Over 13,000 high achieving high school students, from 50 states, have accepted the invitation to become Ventures Scholars.

- Ventures Scholars and their families are invited to attend events to learn about the college planning process and math-, science-, and technology-based careers.

Consortium Member Benefits

The Ventures Scholars Program Consortium brings together high schools, undergraduate institutions, graduate and professional schools, and professional associations. The Program provides opportunities for them to work together and help underrepresented and first-generation college-bound students successfully prepare for math-, science-, and technology-based careers.

Public and private high school guidance counselors link students to the Ventures Scholars Program services, and utilize VSP services to better advise students interested in math-, science- and technology-based education and careers.

Consortium members are provided with a variety of opportunities to communicate with Ventures Scholars and their families and to share information about programs and opportunities at their institutions. Customized selections from the Ventures Scholars database are offered as part of Consortium membership.

Professional association Consortium members utilize the Ventures Scholars Program Web site and other customized communications to inform Ventures Scholars about future careers, provide guidance for their education and opportunities, and connect Ventures Scholars to their members for internships, scholarships, and, eventually, full-time employment.
